MLA STYLE

*Note: Proper format is listed first, followed by an example.
There are different referencing styles as well—check with your teacher for their preference.
There are small differences between PRINT and ON-LINE versions of the same type of source.*

BOOKS

Author Last name, First name. Title. Publisher's location: Publisher's name, Date.

Example: One Author

Cheetham, Nicholas. Universe: A Journey from Earth to the Edge of the Cosmos. London: Quercus, 2006.

Example: Multiple Authors

Rothby, Charles, et al. Caring for Thoroughbred Horses. 2nd ed. Toronto: McGraw Hill Ryerson, 1999.

ENCYCLOPEDIA

"Entry searched." Name of Encyclopedia. Edition/Year.

Example (Print):

"Parakeet." International Wildlife Encyclopedia. 1991 ed.

Example (Electronic):

"Lacrosse." In Canadian Encyclopedia Online. Retrieved May 12, 2010, from <www.thecanadianencyclopedia.com/index.cfm?PgNM=TCESearch&Params=A1>

NEWSPAPER

Author Last name, First name (if known), "Title of Article," Newspaper, (City of publication) Date, page(s).

Example (Print):

Lodge, Robin, "Baltic Nationalism Harshly Rejected by Soviet Leader," The Globe and Mail, (Toronto) 28 November 1988, pp. A1, A5.

Example (Electronic):

Avery, B. (9 February 2000). "Oil Prices likely to remain high: Non-OPEC suppliers unable to challenge cartel," The Edmonton Journal. Retrieved from <www.edmontonjournal.com>

MAGAZINE

Author Last name, First name, "Title," Magazine, volume# (Date), page(s).

Example:

Barber, John, "Worried Sick," Equinox, 41 (September/October, 1988), pp.99

ACADEMIC JOURNALS

Author Last name, First name. "Title." *Journal name* volume# (date):
Database name. Web. Date searched.

Example:

Lawrence, Dave. "Plastic particles permeate the Atlantic." *Oceanus* 48.2 (2010): 18+
Academic OneFile. Web. 5 Sept. 2013.

INTERNET

Author last name, First name (if known). Name of Site. Date of posting/
last update. Name of institution/organization maintaining the site
(*sometimes found in copyright statements*). Date you accessed the site <URL>.

Example: Author Known

Felluga, Dino. Guide to Literary and Critical Theory. 28 Nov. 2003. Purdue University.
10 May 2006 <<http://www.cla.purdue.edu/english/theory>>.

Example: Entire Web Site

Lonely Planet. 2011. Lonely Planet. 28 October 2011 <www.lonelyplanet.com/iceland>.

Example: Page on a Web Site

"How to Make Vegetarian Chili." eHow.com. 2011. Demand Media, Inc. 2 March 2011
<www.ehow.com/how_2063_make-vegetable-chili.html>.

Example: An Image (Including Paintings, Sculptures or Photographs)

For these you must also include the artist's name, the name of the work
(if applicable), the year the work was created & the institution that
houses it and the city (if applicable).
